The projected date for the publication of the first Nasle Panjom is:

*The first day of winter*

The deadline for the submission of articles is:

*December 5<sup>th</sup>*

Articles submitted after this date will be considered for subsequent issues.

It is requested that the authors be less than:

*40 years of age*

The articles maybe submitted in Farsi or English, and should be accompanied by a short abstract, which is not to exceed 100 words in length. The articles themselves are not to exceed 1200 words. The abstract could be in English or Farsi. In special circumstances the submission deadline or the age limit maybe extended. The articles can only be submitted via electronic mail. We request that the articles be submitted in a Microsoft compatible format, or in Tex or PDF. It is also essential that we have the source code in the case of Tex or Latex submission so the adjusting the format of the document will be possible.
